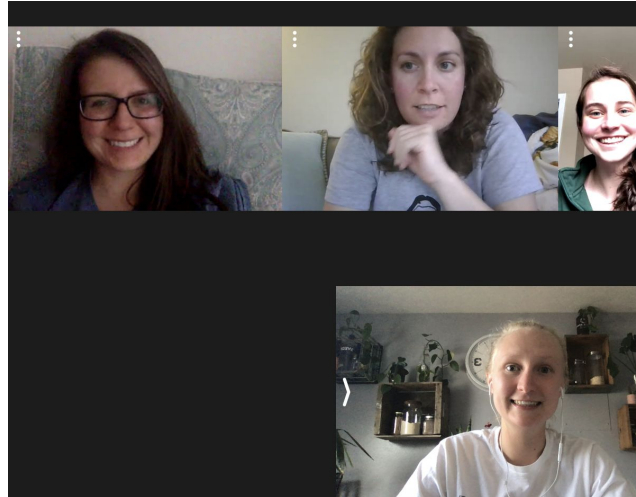
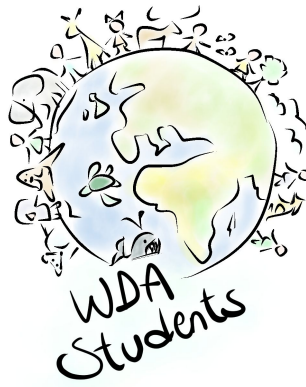

October 18th, 2019, National Parks Service Lunch Lecture: Dr. Karen Fox of Colorado Parks and Wildlife, and Dr. Michelle Verant of the National Park Service presented some of their past and current research projects.



October 26, 2019, W.O.L.F Sanctuary Volunteering: The sanctuary was moving to a new location for more space and we helped prep their new location for building as well as helped to plant trees.

November 15, 2019, Colorado Parks and Wildlife Facilities Tour: Interactive tour of CPW's facilities given by one of the staff veterinarians. Students got a chance to see various animal species on site and ask questions about current research as well as career opportunities.

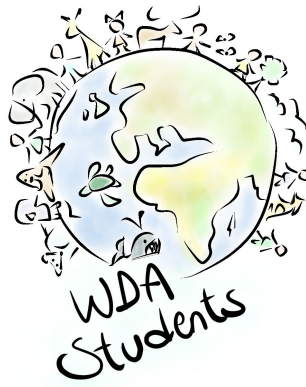
November 19, 2019, ZooPharm Dinner Lecture: Steve Kirschner, the VP of Clinical Research and Development at ZooPharm (Wildlife Pharmaceuticals) discussed the development of today's most effective drug formulations and combinations for anesthesia. The focus was on practical knowledge, case reports, and efficacy/safety studies

December 4, 2019, Marine and Wildlife Parasite Wet Lab: Dr. Ashely McGrew, who runs the parasitology lab at CSU's Diagnostic Medicine Center, showed interested students some of her research in marine parasites. Students got a change to look at gross specimens, slides, and ran some tests on scat samples from seals, wolves, and other species.

January 24, 2020, Victoria Falls Wildlife Trust Lunch Lecture: "Conserving Wildlife in Southern African through Rescue and Rehabilitation, Wildlife Research and Management, Disease Diagnostics and Forensics, and Community Outreach" with Jessica Dawson, CEO and founder of VFWT, and Dr. Mary Wright, wildlife veterinarian and instructor in the Africa wildlife course.

February 20, 2020, Wildlife Histology Cases Dinner Lecture: Dr. Karen Fox from Colorado Parks and Wildlife lead students through interesting wildlife pathology cases. Co-organized with CSU's student chapter of ACVP (American College of Veterinary Pathologists).

Note: While our officer's had plans for more exciting events for this current semester, including a wildlife immobilization clinic with Colorado Parks and Wildlife, the current coronavirus situation has put a hold on all events. We look forward to resuming planning and scheduling once social restrictions are lifted!

We typically hold an annual wildlife immobilization clinic through Colorado Parks and Wildlife every April, with Dr. Lisa Wolfe, however due to coronavirus restrictions, that event had to be canceled. Typically this event allows 20 people to attend and involves both lecture and practical components. Lecture topics include different methods of immobilization, different anesthetic protocols and discussion of ongoing research of anesthesia at the facility. Practical experience includes dart gun target practice, and actual immobilization of a Rocky Mountain Elk who needed routine medical care including hoof trimming and teeth floating.
